Romeo & Tusi, a play by Oscar Kightley



An Aotearoa and Pacifica spin on Romeo and Juliette was born, where Romeo was Māori and Juliette (Tusi) was Samoan. After reading many plays, this funny (and challenging) production hit me as the right fit for our Performing Arts class.

It was an absolute privilege to direct the senior production of Romeo & Tusi, and a privilege to watch the growth and development of the students in this class over the course of the year. For many of our cast it has been their first year in Performing Arts, or the first time they have been in the class since they were Year 9. Tale as old as time, many hours of rehearsal (both in and out of class time), practicing with friends and family, and worries about not being ready for opening night went into getting the show on the stage. I could not be prouder of what our young people presented on opening night; they were funny, energetic, charming and so brave in their performances. They handled their nerves smoothly, supported each other backstage, and had the audience chuckling, what felt like, every other line. Through the whole process I have been frequently impressed with their talent, hard work, resilience and willingness to go above and beyond.
