Through the Te Mana o Kupe Trust, Porirua East students can purchase Chromebook's for a deposit of \$45 then weekly payments from as little as \$4.25 per week by automatic bank payment. This purchase's an Acer C733 Chromebook with a 3 year warranty. If there are any problems, you give it to us and we send it away for fixing. You also get a Chromebook bag for taking it to and from school.
